The WSU Advisor Training Academy (ATA) exists to provide initial and ongoing training, professional development, and recognition for all academic advisors at Wayne State University. In addition, the ATA serves as a means of communication, networking, and community building for professional advisors across the WSU campus.

All advisors are encouraged to pursue the ATA's Level 1 and Level 2 Advisor Certification. Level 1 is designed for new advisors with a focus on understanding Wayne State University, the WSU degree, the role of academic advising at the University, and essential advising skills and competencies.

Level 2 recognizes advisors who go above and beyond in their professional development and who embody the value of "advising as teaching" through presentations and scholarship.

All training offered through the ATA is developed with one or more of <u>NACADA's Academic Advising Core Competencies</u> in mind. ATA programming and other services provided are informed by the following overall goals:

The ATA Thank an Advisor program allows students to express their gratitude in writing to an academic advisor who has made a difference in their educational journey.




ATA Advising Fellows

The ATA training programs have provided a solid foundation for me to develop competence and expertise in the advising-related software I utilize on a daily basis. The ATA is also my first resource if questions come up, and I need assistance. I've benefited from the myriad messages sent through the listserv. I've often used the website and directory, as well as the Teams site. It makes direct singular communication easy, as well as broad communication.

The ATA provides me with the opportunity to stay up to date on relevant University-related information and learn from my colleagues. Both are important to the work I do on a day-to-day basis. I especially like hearing from other advisors and departments on campus. Learning from my peers and colleagues often provides the motivation I need to get reinvested in my work when I'm feeling burnt out.

Level 1 Certification Training provided me with the tools I need to successfully coach our students. Fall 2023 was my first semester working in higher education, so that was important material for me to learn and acclimate to my role. The course was self-paced and virtual, so it allowed me time to grow as I completed it. It was very motivational to receive the Academic Advisor Certificate Level I. I have since been inspired to organize a presentation so I may go to the next level.

Sometimes we need that boost, and when I get a thank you letter it really does remind me of why I do this. It makes me appreciate our students that much more. I am not much into awards these days, but I do love seeing our advisors advance.

I have been impressed at the certificate program and by the variety of workshops offered by ATA. After years of famine, it has really been a feast. Looking at my full professional record for the upcoming salary review really showed how much the ATA has impacted student affairs here over the past ten years. The ATA's consistent communication has been a very reliable source of information for updates and training. I rely heavily on our listserv and am thankful that the ATA has provided an avenue of communication to strengthen our advising community.

The Advising Fellows initiative has allowed me to co-create a program that provides advanced professional development for academic advisors on campus. It has been so rewarding to watch WSU advisors collaborate and grow with one another.
